

After nearly 12 years with the Company, Tom Potter recently became the first Federation member to retire from Tower Colliery.


To mark the occasion and reflecting the esteem in which he is held, Tom received an engraved mug and a wallet containing \$1000 from all his workmates.








### A BEHIND THE SCENES LOOK AT THE 1986 JAMES HARDIE 1000

The Sydney television station, ATN 7, has had a long association with the annual endurance race for touring cars that is held on the public road covering. Mount Panorama in Bathurst on the first Sunday of October. It has proved, above to be mutually beneficial. As ATN's coverage has sophisticated, the motor race has grown in stature & it is ranked only second in importance to the 24 hour race for touring cars held at the Spa track in Belgium. The race is now included as a round of the World Touring Car Championship, a new series which kicked off this year. ATN's coverage is said to command the largest TV audience in the world for a touring car event. For example, last years race was directly relayed, in full, to 38 Australian IV stations as well as TVNZ. Overseas customers included the BBC, while videotape packages were screened throughout Europe, the Middle East, Asia & the US. Two weeks before raceday, the first crew of ATN's engineers & technicians arrive to begin laying the groundwork for a coverage that last year involved 220 staff & cost \$1,000,000. Now that it's time for this years race, a look behind the scenes might be of interest to you to help you appreciate the huge amount of technical expertise & equipment that goes into providing the coverage you see at home. The following is what was used last year. This year's coverage will be basically the same.

ATN presented nearly 12 hours of unbroken coverage. To do this, it needed eight mobile vans plus equipment control buildings (it used some TEN 10 & AAV mobile facilities), 28 cameras (including 3 from race cars), 2 helicopters, 17 videotape machines, character generator & graphics equipment, digital video effects & ATN's new computer scoring system, Racescore. Apart from that, technicians layed kilometres of audio & vision cable throughout the pits & the circuit. Also, much use was made of RF links, while one of the helicopters was a designated camera unit, acting as a backup to chopper used to relay the pictures from the Racecam cars. Another camera was used to cover the action in the pits. This used a portable back-pack microwave link which relayed its signal to the 7 tower. The programme sound was mixed in stereo.

VISION SWITCHING:19 cameras were strategically placed around the circuit & combined with aerial coverage from the ATN Choppercam provided a continuous

trackside coverage of the race progress.

-THE QUARRY (ATN OB 2) - 5 cameras numbered 4 to 8 in sequence from GTX Bend through BP Cutting & the Quarry area to Reid Park were switched & controlled thru! this van.

-CASTROL TOWER (TEN OB 1) - 8 cameras, numbered 9 to 16 from Castrol Curve

around Skyline, the Dipper & the Esses to Forest Elbow.

-UPSTREAM (TEN OB 2) - This van switched the outputs of "The Quarry" van & the "Castrol Tower" van. In addition, another 3 cameras numbered 1 to 3, a remote control camera, number 17, was suspended from a crane over Conrod Straight & the ATN Choppercam were switched thru' this van. The output of this van went to ATN OB 1.

-PITS (ATN OB 3) - This van switched 4 cameras, numbered 20, 21, 22 & 28. Camera 20 was a portable unit working the Pit row & used a triax cable system that plugged into a number of points along the Pit Armco fence. A commentator worked with this camera using a radio mic & a wireless communications system. Camera 21 was also a portable unit, cabled into "Downstream Control" for the pre- & post-race segments. During the race it became a fixed camera in Pit 24 to cover interviews & operate alongside camera 22. Camera 28 was a portable camera, microwave linked to the 7 tower & then cabled to the van.


-SLO MO Van - This videotape area (based around Sony BVU machines) recorded any incidents from the following sources: Quarry, Quarry Isofeed, Castrol, Castrol Isofeed, Upstream & Racecam. Replay from this area was via a single output designated "Slo-Mo". Monitoring of all inputs in the Slo-Mo area was difficult & relied on prompts from any of the five directors (in the different vans) to help locate a possible replay.

-UPDATE Van - This videotape area edited the hourly update segments from both l" & Betacam material. Replay from this area to "Downstream" Control was via a

single output, designated "update".

-DOWNSTREAM (ATN OB 1) - This van was the final assembly & control area for the telecast. This van combined the sources from Upstream Control, Pits, Racecam, Slo-Mo & Update VTR Van & cameras 18, 19 & 23. Camera 21 was also cabled to this van for pre-& post-race segments. An NEC E-Flex was also operated from Downstream control to introduce replays & updates. You don't know what an E-Flex is?... it is a real high-tech piece of equipment. It's the device that makes the picture "explode" into thousands of bits & back together again (TCN 9 use that function on their commercial break play-offs on most of their sports shows for example). The device also can make the picture turn over like a page in a book, do somersaults, twist, backflips, squash & expand the picture, etc, the list of effects is almost limitless. Quite a nifty piece of equipment. (One TV show that uses a lot of these effects is Hey, Hey it's Saturday).

-RACECAM Control (Located at the helipad) - This site was in control of all the Racecam functions. They spoke to the drivers & commentators, controlled the movement of the cameras themselves & also directed the relay chopper. Only one racecam at a time was available. The output was fed to Downstream control. The Racecam cars each had a microwave uplink which was received by the relay chopper. The chopper was needed for relay of signals due to the hilly terrain & trees, etc that severely attenuate the microwave signals & a ground receive station would not be able to provide a good continuous signal. The chopper selected one uplink signal to its downlink transmitter, which was tracked from the grounds of the Hargraeves House Welfare Home, opposite the racetrack. This was also the tracking point for the ATN camera chopper. This chopper also had an uplink receiver which received Racecam No:1 (Mustang) & transmitted this instead of the picture from the camera in the chopper. This allowed two Racecam cars to be switched "back-to-back". The output of the tracking receivers was linked back to the main site, where each was fed to framestore. synchronisers. These devices are necessary so that the picture doesn't roll or jump put on air. Racecam cameras 1 & 2 were controlled by radio telemetry signals radiated from Racecam Control at the Helipad. Racecam 3 was a wide-angle CCD camera. The Racecam director had radio communication with Racecam 1 & 2, & co-ordinated the commentators & drivers' two way conversations. Last year saw a world first when ATN linked up the Racecam car of Dick Johnson (driving a Ford Mustang & running fifth at the time) to the America's Cup yacht Kookaburra II, being skippered by Ian Murray. The set-up & technology involved in this feat would take another page to explain, but in short this achievement required two new pieces of equipment. An AUSSAT Satellite with a transportable earth station & a seagoing Racecam which was waterproof & internally stabilised by a gyroscope. This offered dramatic shots of the yacht's angle to the horizon as it keeled over in the windward legs.





The final programme (minus commercials) from ATN OB 1 Donwstream Control was fed back to the ATN studios at Epping by terrestrial microwave links at Yetholme & Blackheath. Also a Telecom bearer from the main site was used as a back-up path back to ATN. From the ATN studios the programme is distributed to other stations by microwave bearers & AUSSAT. Another bearer was used to from ATN back to Mt. Panorama to provide an "On-Air" signal so that the site knew what was actually going to air. A UHF television transmitter at the main site radiated this signal around the track for the vans at the Quarry & Castrol Tower & to all the cameras around the track, so that they could hit a button a see for themselves what was actually going to air.

The whole set-up is all very simple when you think about it! So when your next sitting in your comfy chair watching the race coverage, spare a thought, (if only a small one), to the huge amount of technology & man-power required to provide you thew viewer, with an interesting programme.


